Seal of Civic Readiness +1 Pathway

Strongly rooted in diversity, equity, and inclusivity

Builds civic agency by developing students' abilities across lines of difference and elevating historically marginalized voices

Recognizes the value of allowing students to have a choice, voice, and ownership in their learning

Empowers students to productively advocate for equitable patterns and practices in society Prepares students to become positive agents of social change and participate in authentic actions and experiences



Criteria for the Seal of Civic Readiness

The Seal is earned through a flexible points-based system. Students must earn points in both **Civic Knowledge** and **Civic Participation**.

Civic Knowledge

Demonstrate a fundamental and functional knowledge of government, law, history, geography, culture, economics, and current events.



Civic Participation

Participate in developmentally appropriate civic experiences that engage students in relevant experiences and include students as active participants.







The Seal of Civic Readiness Pilot 2021-2022 School Year

117 High Schools across New York State participated.

25 Regional Coordinators oversaw the programs.

Approximately 8,000 students will receive the Seal of Civic Readiness in June 2022.

Key Takeaways from the Pilot

- Teacher involvement and engagement
 was critical
- Connections with outside organizations led to increased meaning for students
- Successful in districts of all types
- Almost 8,000 students are candidates
