The updated policy clearly defines various forms of academic misconduct, including:

- 1. Cheating
- Plagiarism
- 3. Fabrication of data/information
- 4. Academic dishonesty
- 5. Unauthorized use of Artificial Intelligence tools
- 6. Testing misconduct

It's crucial to understand that academic integrity is fundamental to a student's educational journey and personal growth. Engaging in academic misconduct not only undermines a student's own learning but also strains the trust within our school community and can have far-reaching consequences.

Students should be aware that academic misconduct can lead to several serious outcomes, such as:

- Long-term impact on their academic and professional futures.
